Have students learn how to calculate a rate of return and how to divide a large area into smaller lots with these math problems. Explain to students that they simply need to convert 65% to a decimal (0.65), and then multiply that number by 30. For the first problem, demonstrate how to work out the solution if students are still having difficulty, where "S" equals shots made: So Sam made 19.5 shots.
